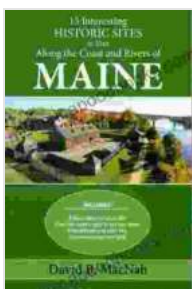


15 Interesting Historic Sites To Visit Along The Coast And Rivers Of Maine

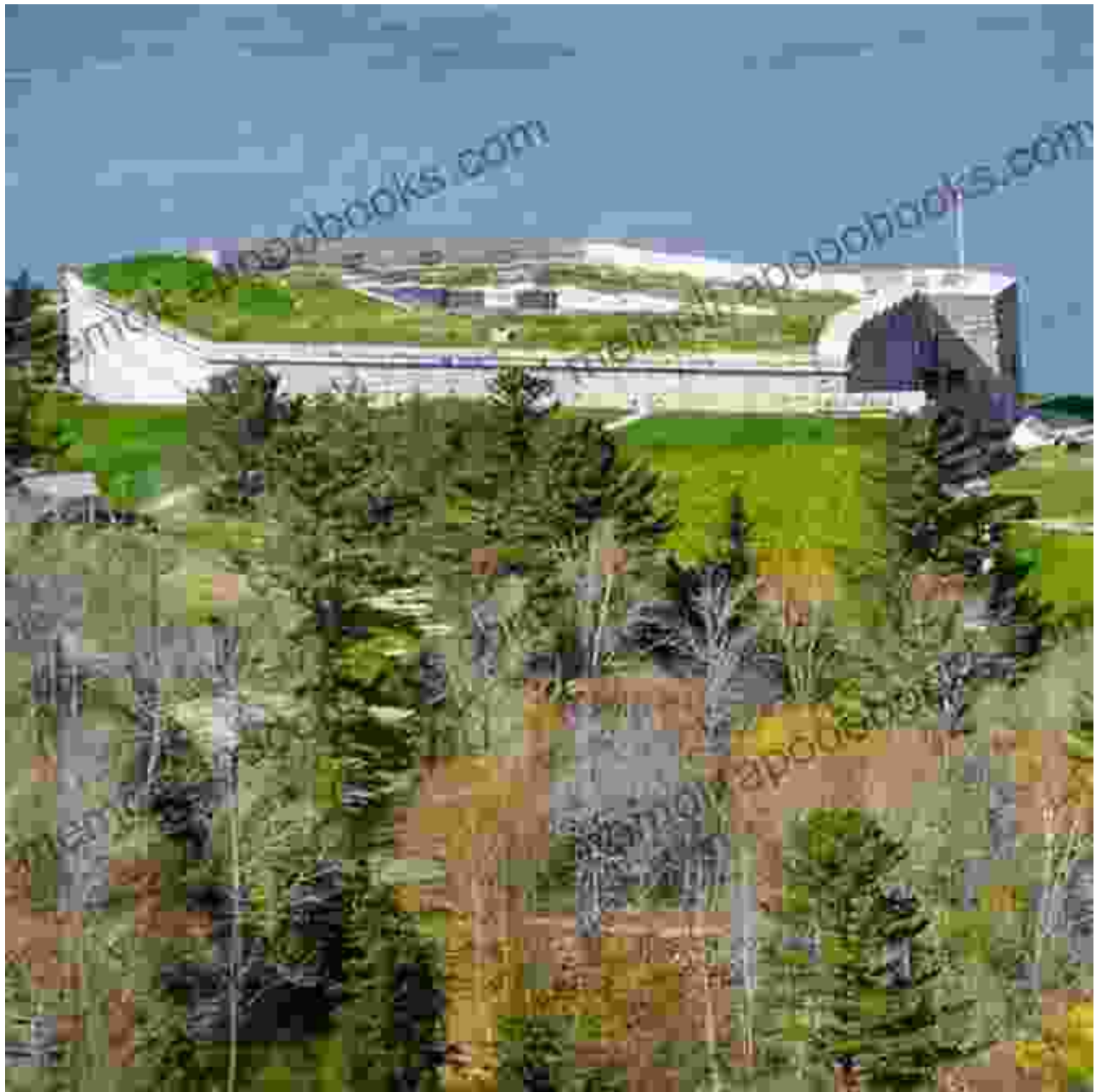

2. Popham Colony State Historic Site, Phippsburg

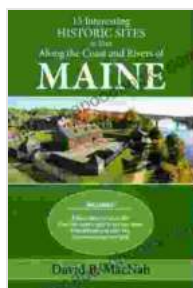
of numerous shipyards. Today, the park is a popular destination for leisurely walks, picnics, and kayaking.

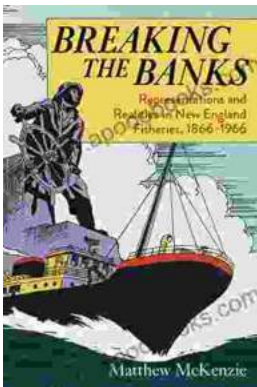

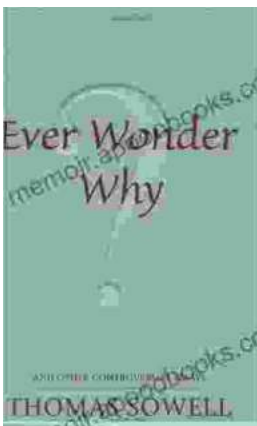
