  - How can the novel help us to understand the importance of food safety and workers' rights?

#### Section 3: The Environment

- Reading: "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson
- Discussion Questions:
  - How did the book raise awareness about the dangers of pesticides?
  - What are the different ways in which the book challenges the prevailing attitudes towards the environment?
  - How can the book help us to understand the importance of environmental conservation?
- **Reading:** "The Great Gatsby" by F. Scott Fitzgerald
- Discussion Questions:

- How does the novel depict the environmental destruction caused by industrialization?
- What are the different ways in which the characters respond to the environmental degradation?
- How can the novel help us to understand the relationship between humanity and the natural world?
- **Reading:** "The Road" by Cormac McCarthy
- Discussion Questions:
  - How does the novel depict the consequences of environmental catastrophe?
  - What are the different ways in which the characters struggle to survive in a post-apocalyptic world?
  - How can the novel help us to understand the importance of hope and resilience?




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
